Assistive Technology in the Classroom

Applications of assistive technology in the classroom open a new world of possibilities in educating a student with a disability. By adapting the environment, a student is able to take full advantage of the educational environment in ways that were never before imagined. Teaching can be tailored to compensate for the different learning needs of most children inside the regular classroom.

Free and Appropriate Education (FAPE)

By federal law, Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA, P.L. 101-476 amended in 1997), every student with a disability is entitled to "a free and appropriate education" in the "least restrictive environment." In addition, special education and related services must meet the individual needs of each identified student and must address inclusion of Assistive Technology. Services listed in the Individual Education Plan must be provided by the school at no cost to the parent.

Public vs Private Schools

It is important to note that children with disabilities in a private education setting may or may not be entitled to the same FAPE as children in a public school setting. The distinguishing factor is how the child was placed in the private school setting. If the child is placed in a Private Education setting by the Local Education Agency (LEA) or other public agency, the LEA must ensure that the child:

- Is provided specially designed instruction and related services for that child, and at no cost to the parents;
- Provided with an education that meets the standards of the LEA; and
- Has all the rights of any child with a disability served by the LEA

If parentally placed:

- A proportionate amount of the LEA's federal monies is provided to private schools
 - Ex: if 10% of the LEA's children attend private school, then 10% of the IDEA funds go to the private schools.
- Children parentally placed in a private school setting may not receive the same amount of services as children with disabilities in a public school setting.
- · Child does not have an individual right/entitlement to special education and related services
- A Service Plan takes the place of the IEP
 - Child shall receive services provided in the service plan.
