A Guide to Adapted Toys in Kentucky

What does an "adapted" toy mean? In order to provide access by a child with a disability, most battery-operated toys can be adapted to use a variety of switches. The type of switch and length of wire is determined by the ability of the child who operates it.

Through the use of adaptive toys, more children with disabilities are being provided the same play opportunities available to children without disabilities. The benefits of play to young children and infants in all stages of development are numerous. They learn to interact with and manipulate their environment, learn cause-and-effect relationships, develop positive feelings about themselves, and develop gross and fine motor skills. Playing with toys can be a strong motivation for all children and can be used to positively reinforce many desired behaviors.

Lending Libraries

The KATS Network provides a network of lending libraries across the state. They are: enTECH in Louisville, Western Kentucky Assistive Technology Toy Library in Owensboro, Redwood Assistive Technology Center Toy Library in Ft. Mitchell, and Carl D. Perkins Vocational Training Center in Thelma. The centers will loan toys to children or youths with disabilities, their parents, teachers or therapist. They will loan to any eligible person in their service area and in special cases statewide.

These AT Resource Centers (ATRCs) are a part of Kentucky's online lending library and exchange site for Assistive Technology. This is a free online service to find equipment available for loan, sale, demonstration, or giveaway. The available toys for loan can be viewed here. Carl D. Perkins Vocational Training Center (CDPVTC) – Thelma

The CDPVTC Toy Library began in 2015 with funding from the KATS Network. A variety of adapted toys are available and can be borrowed for a complimentary 30-day trial.

The Enabling Technologies of Kentuckiana (enTECH) – Louisville

The enTECH Toy Library is funded from First Steps, WHAS and other grants. Eligible patrons can borrow up to four adaptive toys for a period of four weeks. The only charges are for late returns and damaged toys and they may be waived if there are extenuating circumstances.

What is Available

A variety of special switches, switch-adapted toys, and instructional toys are available. In addition, several books about adaptive toys are available for loan.

Western Kentucky Assistive Technology Center (WKATC) – Owensboro

The WKATC Toy Library began in 1994 with funding from First Steps and the KATS Network. A variety of adapted toys are available and can be borrowed for a complimentary 2-week trial. If the item is needed for an extended period, there is a monthly rental based on the value of the equipment.

Redwood Assistive Technology Center (REDWOOD) – Ft. Mitchell

The Redwood Toy Library was started in 1997 from parents' donations, funds from the KATS Network, Cincinnati Association for the Blind and other organizations. Toys are loaned for a month and charges based on toy value are as follows: under \$500 = \$10; from \$500 to \$1,000 = \$25.00; and from \$1,000 to \$3,000 = \$35.

What is Available

A variety of special switches, switch-adapted toys, and instructional toys are available. Augmentative Communication devices and materials for education are also part of the inventory.
